





The "Unison France-Laos" (UFL) project

Pringing generations together, from the end of life... to childhood!

- ... A story that began at the end, with elderly people in Luang Prabang. An adventure that started where everything seemed to end. By accompanying people at the end of their lives, we understood something obvious: **aging is a mirror**. A mirror that reflects our fears, our unspoken words, and our hopes: **the right to live together**, at any age.
- ... A story linked to Buddha that an old man told us: "In 2020, a monster will want to eat the planet, but it will die of indigestion." When the pandemic struck in 2020 and the world trembled, we thought back to him and his prophecy. What if the real monster was **our denial?** Our refusal to see that **life on our planet Earth** and **aging** go **hand in hand**.
- The global problem: We are overwhelmed: precariousness (employment, income), unhappiness at work (burnout, psychosocial risks), isolation (seniors, young people, regions), aging populations, climate change (ecological emergency), not to mention the abuses that will come with Al. Traditional models welfare dependency, gig economy, precariousness no longer meet the challenges.
- One question: Our children are legally responsible for us. But should they sacrifice their lives for ours? No. Just as we have lived ours, they have the right to live theirs. So, what if we invented a new way of looking at life? What if aging were a planned process, focused on human needs, with a sustainable environment and lifestyle, where each generation enriches the other, with respect and reciprocity?
- Our vision: To build a future where everyone finds their place to avoid hitting a brick wall in the face of explosive social and societal tensions, with a holistic approach to work and living together, and with a new ethic. Young people need us, just as we need them. We are breaking down the codes of social binary thinking to reinvent the links between generations, cultures, and territories.



Our experiences gave rise to OUI ENSEMBLE. A project born out of caring for the elderly... to better support children.

A system that is a puzzle designed to reinvent the way we live and work in the era of the Solopreneur: connecting and acting independently, with a model self-financed by collective intelligence based on ethical principles.

- Why are France and Laos working together? ... Because climate change knows no borders. ...Because, in the face of our aging and fragmented societies, traditional models no longer meet people's real needs, which is why we have decided to go against the grain and build a humanistic and concrete alternative.
- Why start with children? ...Because that's where it all begins. ...Because the alliance between youth and experienced generations is the key to breaking isolation, passing on knowledge, and inventing a new model of society.

From children to seniors... from seniors to children. A virtuous circle with a futuristic and supportive vision, with a **bold and innovative** project: An intergenerational model, where children and seniors learn from each other. A bridge between France and Laos, where experiences intersect and enrich each other. **A collective commitment**, where sharing and creativity weave the thread of time, proving that united generations are an inexhaustible force.

- 1. **Respect:** Respect for the school, its teachers, and its central role in Laotian society.
- 2. Sustainability: A long-term commitment to ensuring the sustainability of bilingual classes by including a school canteen to promote healthy eating, coupled with sports activities to help children grow up healthier, thereby providing a stable environment for students.
- 3. Solidarity and sharing: A balanced cooperation between France and Laos, where each party contributes its strengths and resources to build a common future together.

P Our solution in the field: The Link Worker. A profession with a future, acting as a bridge between France and Laos. This social entrepreneur and mediator is proposing a gentle revolution rooted in the social and solidarity economy to transform the world of work and lifestyles. This multifaceted professional reorganizes continued employment at every stage of life, adapting to everyone's needs. The Link Worker thrives within an innovative economic model.

Our actions?

• In Laos: We are initially working on the construction of a school canteen at Luang Prabang Primary School, a place of generational memory, with the aim of also providing active support to Lao French bilingual classes, a living symbol of our partnership based on solidarity.

At the same time, we are helping disadvantaged children, based on the principle of pooling resources with partners working toward the same goal to optimize means and results.

Today, we are motivated to join the team at the Luang Prabang branch of the French Institute in Laos:

- ...Because 2025 is the year when our teams in France and Laos will join forces to create a lasting impact.
- ...Because UFL works in collective intelligence in Luang Prabang, already teaming up with the Primary School and its bilingual Lao French classes, with Michel DELAFON's Francophone Club, and with members of the Francophone Guides association.
- ...Because Oui Ensemble is a citizen movement, a shared vision, and a concrete solution to address the social and societal challenges of today and tomorrow, and it seems logical to us to also work with the French Institute to unite our resources around the common goal of promoting the French language.
